Two years ago, in late February, a mosquito bit me down by my pond. Last year, in early March, I burnt the grasses off my dry meadow and woodland hills. Both years the crocuses were up by March 1. This year I can nearly walk over the fence between my back garden and the cow pasture, due to the immense hard-frozen drifts of snow.

You never know quite what you are going to get when it comes to the seasons and the weather. It's easy to lose faith in weather forecasts and forecasters, and the groundhog certainly is not to be trusted. Can we still believe the old proverb that March comes in like a lion, and goes out like a lamb?

Humans, until recently, were able to forecast long-term weather simply by paying attention to the natural world and the clouds. Today, the world's best computer weather modules don't always agree on weather predictions nor are they always accurate. So, what can we predict? One old proverb still holds true, that "nothing is certain, except death and taxes".

It is part of our human makeup to want to have certainty and predictability in life, because that gives security, comfort, stability, assurance, etc. This leads

us to another old proverb that still holds true, "you never know what's around the corner". After all, we really don't know what's in store for us. No matter how secure our life may seem, our next breath is never promised to us.

When we seriously embrace that life is so uncertain, how should that affect how we live? Should we throw caution to the wind and say, "What the hey, let's just do whatever we want" and live a life of chaotic freedom? Should we buckle down and say, "We must live this life very safely, predictably and orderly in order to give us the best possible chance of living another day"?

Most of us live somewhere in between. We place ourselves in the midst of society and do our best at following society's rules, yet we have a desire to be our own individual person. Though the reaper might be hiding in wait right around the corner, it is also possible that a long life may be what's in store. There is a balance of living like there is no tomorrow but living so there is a tomorrow.

It seems like common sense that each person is in charge of his or her own actions and the path they choose in life. Yet not everyone realizes they have freedom of thought and choice and that whatever they choose will have an effect on the world around them.

Not too long ago, children and youth were taught what to think and to blindly follow orders, rather than how to think for themselves. But the Baby Boomers rejected this concept, becoming free thinkers on their own, and then prepared future generations to be free thinkers. Today, overall, our culture in the United States has changed to the point to where we no longer debate if youth, and all people, have the right to be free-thinkers. Rather, we contemplate the best way to help our youth, and folks of all ages, to embrace their individualism and how to make the best choices, while recognizing

that they are part of a greater whole.

Certainly, there are still institutions (largely found in some Christian churches and denominations) who say thinking is bad and that you must believe and do as you are told. But our culture continues to further embrace developing the young minds of our nation to think for themselves and to build positive working relationships with others. Though we are individuals, we do have to keep in mind the communities we are part of, whether we have chosen to be part of that community or life's circumstances place communities around us. And the choices we make need to keep in mind those communities.

Christ calls us to love one another and, if we are to follow this commandment, our goal as individuals is to help build beloved communities. By the giving and receiving of love, by the eradication of inequality, and by embracing that God loves us all equally, we are able to form communities that are in the image of God's loves.

There are always unpredictable changes that will occur in our communities. New people come in, others die or leave. As each individual brings with them and takes with them their own strengths and weaknesses, their gain or loss to the community affects the community as a whole. Likewise, there are internal and external forces that bring change. How we transition and transform is up to how we embrace and uphold one another amidst the change.

It is easy to succumb to the mindset that we are not in control of our lives—and if we are, it is very limited. This is an over-focusing on the forces that are insisting on controlling the destiny of our life. And it is an over-compliance with the voices that tell us what to do.

With confidence in our own self and in our ability to make decisions, we can learn that we do not have to succumb to

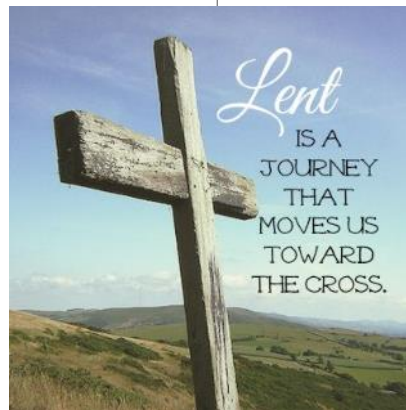

all the external voices and forces that are imposing themselves upon us. We have the ability to put up a barrier to protect ourselves. And the strongest part of this barrier is when we choose to make our own decisions and follow the path we believe in.

Though we can't repel and reject all the life-changing forces that inflict themselves upon us, we can limit them. We can make educated decisions that will allow us to freely live as we believe God calls us to live. We can freely live to understand, embrace and be who we truly are. We have much more control over the world around us than the world would like us to realize. We can actually make major changes to our own self and to the world around us, for better or for worse.

And together, as a community, we can have even more power, which can also be for better or for worse. If we seek betterment, then we need to seek the love we find in following Christ. Many Christians themselves are destructive because they have been following the voices that have either lost sight of or never gained the understanding that God is love, and that all of our actions must follow love. So those destructive, harmful voices need to be silenced by our outpouring of Christian

love. We need to help free those who are oppressed by the forces and voices who are void of love. And we need to be sure that we are freed from such oppression as well.

As we enter Lent, we have the opportunity again to predict who we would like to become by Easter Sunday. What limits us in our life that we need freed from? What areas would we like to grow into? What oppressions must we be freed from? In what way might we be oppressing others, and how do we stop doing that? What do we want our short-term and long-term future to look like? How do we make that happen? What part of that requires us to work on our own? What part of that requires that we lean upon our communities to help us?

Lent is a time to deeply reflect upon our lives. It is a walk to the Cross, so that on Good Friday we can truly have let go of what we need to let go of and on Easter Sunday to rise to new life. It's up to our own self to choose if we really want to go on this spiritual and self-reflective journey and to make the Easter season truly powerful in our life. Or we can just be content with enjoying the material actions of Easter, by dressing up, going to church, cooking a ham, and eating too much candy.

One path will empower us to break through the barriers that are currently around us, helping us to live into freely being our own self. The other path is one of comfort and, in the end, neglect to take the opportunity to better oneself. But we don't actually have to do this during the season of Lent, or Advent. We can do it at any time. It's just helpful to utilize this time of Lent because it gives us a time period to work with and a goal of resurrection for our own life alongside celebrating the resurrection of Christ. Utilizing Lent helps us keep in mind that Christ is walking with us. We have the Holy Spirit reaching out to us, filling us, and seeking to work through us. Our Creator has a path ready for us. And what better way to celebrate Easter than with a free new life of our own, and a stronger, more beloved community surrounding us.

In our life together, we won't always be able to predict what lies ahead. But that doesn't mean we can't have a say in the matter most of the time. Further, sometimes we are going to have to take risks. Sometimes we are going to have to go outside of our comfort zones. Sometimes we are going to have to stand up to forces and voices, even though the consequences can be daunting, in order to be the change agents who will bring love, equality and freedom into the world.

Together we can receive and spread the love of Christ and seek to utilize this love to help free others from the bondage they find themselves entrapped in. Likewise, we can reach out to receive the support we need to find our own freedom.

Together, our choices can change this world, enabling love to permeate everywhere, and to ensure that freedom is received by all. As we walk toward the Cross together, we can find the new life that empowers us to truly be Christ's disciples, which is a resurrection this world truly needs.

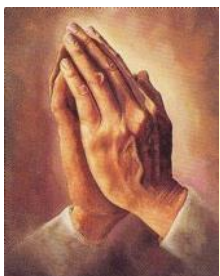
